

OVERVIEW

In the United States, acute and chronic wounds affect around 6.5 million patients. The need for treatment of wounds is growing rapidly due to an aging population and a sharp rise in the incidence of diabetes and obesity. This symposium will provide information on the science behind wound management, treatment and prevention of: diabetic foot ulcers, management of mixed disease, vascular studies interpretation, general treatments and causes of lymphedema, along with management of osteomyelitis, antimicrobial dressings in wound care and the challenges of treating the diabetic patient in the hyperbaric environment.
